What is equity?

Essentially equity means a focus on fairness rather than sameness. It means to achieve a fair and just society, privilege and power needs to be more evenly distributed.

What is gender equity?

Gender equity recognises that we don't all start on a level playing field. Within all communities access to power and resources differ according to many factors, of which gender is just one.

We know that a more gender-equitable community benefits us all.

The issue of gender equity is everybody's business and everybody's responsibility. We need to work as a whole community to create a more equitable Swan Hill District and what better place to start than with our future generation!



The why

Family violence is a serious and systemic issue in Australian society, with currently one woman a week killed by her current or former partner.

Swan Hill Rural City has some of the highest rates of family violence incidents in the state. The time to act is now.

We know that gender inequality is a key driver of family violence, particularly violence experienced by women. The Swan Hill District Gender Equity Network is committed to preventing violence before it occurs, and creating a community where all people are free from the constraints of gender inequality and live healthy, happy, and productive lives. The key focus on the network is on challenging rigid gender stereotypes and roles in the early years.

What can we do?

Parents and carers play an important role in promoting gender equality and building children's resilience to rigid gender stereotypes in early childhood.

Early childhood is a crucial time to influence gender roles and stereotypes as these are developed from an early age.

Ways to promote gender equality to children:

- by reading gender neutral books. See the gender neutral book list on the next page from Respect Victoria.
- Supporting a range of activities for both girls and boys.
- Be aware of gender marketing of toys that may influence preferences as children grow older.
- · Role-playing, story telling and games
- · Having conversations with children around gender.


